





He received a standing ovation and rousing applause at the inaugural induction ceremony of the new UVI Athletic Hall of Fame on Friday, January 12, 2001. Coach Eugene Werts and 13 other athletic notables were inducted into the Hall of Fame. The event was part of the grand opening activities of the new UVI Sports & Fitness Center on the St. Thomas campus. Coach Werts began his 30-year career with UVI in 1966, when the then "College of the Virgin Islands" had been open for just four years. Among his many sports achievements, Coach Werts, a career sportsman, was a member of the award-winning 1957-59 Tennessee State University Basketball Team, coached the Virgin Islands Olympic Basketball Team and has devoted his life to encouraging youth sporting activities.
